Mission

Our mission is to cultivate thought and industry leadership by immersing emerging leaders in the real estate and land use industry in the challenges and opportunities of developing the Greater Toronto Area.

Program Overview

Participants will have an opportunity to provide leadership on a critical Toronto issue over the course of the eight-month program. Working in teams, participants will be responsible for sharing their expertise and advice to develop recommendations. Participants will be exposed to thought leaders across the key disciplines of land development. Leaders will have the opportunity to collaborate with top industry peers from various real estate disciplines, to engage in solving real land use challenges within a defined region of Toronto involving key stakeholders from the private, public, and non-profit community sectors.

Focus for 2022-23

The focus of this year's Curtner Urban Leadership Program will be on understanding city building opportunities as something to be excited about instead daunted by. We will prioritize civic challenges and issues, investigate alternative approaches from around the world, and develop solutions that appreciate the challenge but also celebrate and engage communities with joy. The participants will lead monthly sessions focused on specific related topics, identify and discuss problems, issues and challenges and provide solutions, examples and best/emerging practices. In addition to the monthly sessions, the participants will work in groups to develop a community-focused, joy-enabling approach or intervention to a selected development challenge. These plans will be presented at a public Town Hall at the end of the program.

The 2022-2023 Program highlight is an (optional) in-person visit to Montreal (Spring 2023 and at an additional cost), supplemented with some virtual visits, to explore real-life examples of civic challenges with community joy in the city, and to hear from and interact with the on-the-ground leaders responsible for this work.
