


# Panelist | Clay Frickey, City of Fort Collins Urban Renewal Authority, Redevelopment Program Manager, Interim Planning Manager



Clay Frickey is the redevelopment program manager, focusing on managing the operations of the Urban Renewal Authority. Prior to joining the Urban Renewal Authority, Clay worked in the City of Fort Collins Planning Department. His work included a mix of development review and long-range planning efforts with a focus on affordable housing. Amongst his accomplishments were being the project planner on the largest development in Fort Collins, comanaging the update to the City's Affordable Housing Strategic Plan, and providing strategic direction on the housing component of City Plan. Clay holds a bachelor's degree from University of Denver and a master's degree from Cornell University and is a member of the American Institute of Certified Planners (AICP).

### Panelist | Brendan Hanlon, Colorado State University, VP for University Operations, Chief Financial Officer



Brendan Hanlon serves as vice president for University Operations and Chief Financial Officer overseeing administrative departments including Facilities Management, Office of Budgets, Business and Financial Services which includes Procurement Services, and Safety and Risk Services with oversight of Environmental Health, Policy Office, Clery Compliance, Risk Management and Insurance, Parking and Transportation, Central Receiving/Mail Services, and the CSU Police Department. Brendan also oversees many University initiatives and programs such as Commitment to Campus and Strategic Partnerships. Hanlon most recently served as deputy mayor and chief financial officer for the City and County of Denver. His leadership impacted more than a decade of city budgets, three General Obligation bond programs to fund hundreds of city projects from parks to museums to mobility improvements and supported the establishment and subsequent doubling of the city's first affordable housing fund. Hanlon worked closely with the community and city council to close the city's structural budget gap and led the Budget Office and the Department of Finance during the recovery from the Great Recession and the pandemic while maintaining the city's AAA rating since 2010. He was with the City and County of Denver since 2000.

Hanlon earned a bachelor's degree with a double major in political science and history, and a master's of public affairs with a concentration in public budgeting, from the University of Connecticut.

Mike Scholl has over two decades of nationwide planning experience with consultants, community groups, and most recently as economic development manager for the City of Loveland, Colorado.

Through vision and persistence Mike has brought success to many development projects. Mike conceived and managed Loveland's Foundry redevelopment project, which opened in 2019 and won the Governor's Award for 2020 Best Project with New Building, and managed Loveland's Gallery Flats redevelopment project, which was awarded the Governor's Award for best 2015 infill project in Colorado.

Kristin is the former executive director for Together We Grow, an industry consortium of the largest global interests in food and agriculture. In this role she launched and led a national organization focused on building a diverse and inclusive pipeline of talent to drive the innovation needed to feed the future. She is a skilled connector and future-leaning strategist who believes in the power of collaboration. Kristin's career has been focused on bringing people and organizations together to change the landscape of opportunities, with a particular focus on equity. She has done this work through the lenses of public health, policy advocacy, and community development. Prior to Together We Grow, she helped lead Kimbal Musk's national nonprofit Big Green, leading fundraising, strategy, and program delivery in the school garden space.
