The Real Estate market is expected to see a shift towards a "new normal" after the pandemic-fueled market distortion. The event began with a national perspective on the Trends report from Haley Anderson of PWC. The ULI and PwC reports indicated that most real estate professionals are cautiously optimistic about the longer-term prospects for the industry, despite rising interest rates and uncertainty over future market conditions. The Speakers shared their insights and predictions for the Real Estate market in 2023. The program attendees were also given the opportunity to network with other industry professionals. **107 attendees.**

### **ULI New Mexico: YLG Presents: CNM Catering & Brewing Facility Tour**

The attendees of this program participated in a tour of the CNM Catering & Brewing Facility. The new facility incorporates state-of-the-art equipment, providing the proper resources for students. The CNM project included two new labs for the brewing program supporting the entire process of brewing, packaging, and distribution. Distillery and wine programs will also work from these labs. **51 attendees.** 

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### **Site Design Competition**

The event gave people the opportunity to take underutilized sites, which had been nominated by city councilors in the Fall of 2022 and create design proposals for those sites. Architects, planners, financers, developers and other people involved in land use & real estate formed teams to work on various underutilized sites. The workshop generated many positive conversations and innovative ideas. Councilor Fiebelkorn focused on a site at the southwest corner of University & Menaul, which is part of the Menaul Metropolitan Redevelopment Area. ULI New Mexico looks forward to continued engagements and conversations with stakeholders to help bring new energy to underutilized sites in the Albuquerque metro area. This work was continued at Intersections 2023. **45 attendees.** 











### **Espanola Housing Summit**

The Espanola Housing Summit generated numerous dynamic conversations about housing in Northern New Mexico. The conversation centered around the housing deficit of 32,000-units which is faced by Northern New Mexico. This unique and historic area is also faced with significant employment growth and housing sustainability. **66 attendees.** 











### **Young Leaders Present: Imperial Inn Tour**


This unique redevelopment project includes 52 guest rooms, 16 residential suites, and approximately 4,410 square feet of rentable commercial space for micro-retail and restaurateurs. This \$7.6 million private development project leverages a \$700,000 Metropolitan Redevelopment Agency (MRA) loan to create new spaces for commerce, hospitality, and residential living. This event gave people the opportunity to tour this facility and learn more about this valuable investment in the city of Albuquerque. **34 attendees.**


### **Next Steps for Solving Northern NM Housing Crisis**

### A to Z of ADU's: Housing Breakfast


