WLI NY congratulates this year's Alice Connell scholarship winners, **Kathleen Cayetano** and **Prentiss Darden**. Their trip to the Fall Meeting was funded by the generous support of the scholarship in memory of Alice Connell, a founding member of WLI and chair of ULI NY and many leadership committees.



Kathleen has more than eight years of architectural experience and is active in the YLG and WLI. She has contributed to several global design competitions and early concept design work. Her diverse project experience includes 150 square foot popup kiosks in New York, a 180 square meter mixed-use tower in Auckland, NZ, and year-long master planning proposals. Kathleen is an architect at Woods Bagot, and previously worked at other internationally recognized architecture practices such as Hollwich Kushner and Office for Metropolitan Architecture in Hong Kong. Kathleen graduated with a BA from Smith College and received her M.Arch from the University of Toronto.



Prentiss Darden works at the intersection of design, engineering, and financial modeling to address climate change through decentralized water systems and resilient landscapes. As an Innovation Strategist at Sherwood Design Engineers, she integrates financial and performance metrics into water infrastructure feasibility studies to assess alternatives from bottom line and triple bottom line perspectives. She facilitates workshops about innovative water infrastructure and resilient cities and has contributed to publications about sustainable urbanism, including technical guidance for UN Habitat's New Urban Agenda. Her project experience includes Sustainability Pavilion for World Expo 2020 Dubai, ASU Science + Technology Building ISTB7, Silicon Valley corporate campus Master Planning, Water Reuse Design Guidelines for Hawaii Public Schools, and Landscape Design Guidelines for TD Bank.

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What is your leadership style? Do you think being a woman impacts this?

I have two core beliefs that inform my work. One is that we have to consciously choose to be excellent and commit to excellence as its own end. The second is in the primacy of the team over the individual to compete in a complex and dynamic marketplace. I have some experience in team building, and I look for individuals who care about excellence but who also want to be part of the group. As a team, we can be all be demanding of each other for the sake of producing superior results, but we also have to be supportive and willing to take a backseat when it is someone else's time to shine. I try to cultivate an environment in which expectations are set very high, but there is the underlying sense that the team has your back. Most high-functioning teams today are actually small, nimble, and comprised only of individuals who can punch above their weight class. Consistently bringing out each other's best requires a commitment to coaching and empathy. Female leaders are natural fits for leading these types of teams and sustaining the culture that fuels them.

What does your job entail?

I advise owners of real estate on capital markets and investment sale strategies and I execute sales transactions with an emphasis on New York City development and redevelopment opportunities, multi-family and affordable housing, and office building sales.

How did you get into real estate and what makes you stay in the industry? Do you have any advice for other women in real estate?

Halfway through a three-year Master of Architecture program at Penn, I decided I did

not want to actually practice architecture after graduating. I walked across campus to Wharton and took every class I could at the MBA-level related to real estate and finance while finishing my architecture degree. My first job in real estate was management consulting for large corporations with massive portfolios of owned and leased space. From there, I got into capital markets and investment sales. I will stay in the industry because there is always more to learn, and there are infinite paths for career growth.

What are you most passionate about (outside of work)?

My large extended family spread out all over the world, and especially my husband and daughter who are right here in NYC. I am also passionate about New York City itself and finding solutions to our City's biggest challenges, including homelessness and housing security.

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What is your leadership style? Do you think being a woman impacts this?

I seek to provide my teammates with an understanding of the goals and timeline we are driving towards and aim to communicate in a way that resonates with each individual. I think as women we tend to shy away from discord so that may impact my style; however, overall work culture is trending towards more collaborative communication and workflow and as a result productivity is increasing.

What does your job entail?

As a Development Manager at Lendlease, I facilitate the design, development, financing, execution and delivery of new developments. I am currently working on 100 Claremont – a mixed-use development project in Morningside Heights.

How did you get into real estate and what makes you stay in the industry? Do you have any advice for other women in real estate?

My passion for real estate lies in its ability to create a meaningful impact on both the built environment and in our communities. Working in development allows me to actualize my vision for urban revitalization and placemaking.

My advice is not specific to real estate: women need to advocate for both themselves and other women. I recently learned that according to the World Economic Forum, it will take ~200 years to reach economic gender parity in the workplace. Let's help reduce that timeframe!

What are you most passionate about (outside of work)?

I love spending quality time with my friends and family, traveling to new destinations across the globe, playing tennis, and volunteering with my Pomeranian, who is a registered therapy dog with the Good Dog Foundation.
