YLG Member Spotlight



Katherine Salvatori Project Manager at BXP

YLG Programming Committee Member

For YLG's Fall 2024 member spotlight, Programming Co-Chair Josh Koss interviewed Katherine Salvatori, a Project Manager at BXP and Programming Committee member. Katherine recently coordinated YLG's tour of Park Ave office developments on September 25.

This interview has been condensed and slightly revised for clarity.

Josh: You recently organized a well-attended ULI tour on the revitalization of office on Park Ave. Tell us about it!

Katherine: Midtown East's 2017 rezoning sparked 6.5 million square feet of new office development. Rich Monopoli, Senior Vice President at BXP, and Andrew Cleary, Principal at KPF, led a walking tour of some of these new projects. We visited One Vanderbilt, the Company at 335 Madison Ave, and BXP's own 343 Madison. We then strolled past new development projects at 250 and 270 Park Avenue, and repositioning projects at Lever House and The Seagram Building, before concluding at The Hugh food hall at 601 Lexington. We also discussed how this submarket is performing, boasting sub-10% availability compared to 18% across Midtown as a whole. Josh: Why is the Park Ave office corridor outperforming other submarkets?

Katherine: Primarily access and location, although amenitization is also important. Offices in this area offer workers single-seat commutes, from the Metro North or LIRR, without additional transit, making it highly convenient. At BXP, we're also focused on placemaking, by offering public plazas, landscaping, and food halls. New office product in this submarket is highly amenitized—employers want to create a work environment that employees enjoy. In this competitive market, decision-makers are constantly looking to stay ahead by providing these enhanced experiences.

Josh: What trends are you currently following at BXP?

Katherine: We're paying close attention to the concept of workplace hospitality, which extends beyond just amenities to service. At BXP, we continually assess our clients' operational needs, and that includes offering white-glove service to enhance the workplace experience. For example, the Savoy Club amenity space at the General Motors building features a best-in-class fitness and health center, food and beverage options, and conferencing space equipped with catering. At 360 Park Avenue South, BXP recently developed a bespoke client amenity program including an event and conference space, and an on-site restaurant and bar by Chef James Kent.

Waterfront Resilience: Protecting Cities from Rising Seas





On October 22, YLG hosted a panel on how to create resilient real estate that accommodates, protects, or retreats from the more frequent environmental events the world is experiencing. The speakers included Alexander Creem from NYCEDC and Kaleen Juarez and Depo Thomas from SCAPE. They discussed three projects with different end goals and purposes for resilient infrastructure: Sunset Park Bush Pier 6 in Brooklyn, Dorchester Coastline in Boston, and China Basin Park in San Francisco.

The Sunset Park project, currently under construction, is managed by NYCEDC. It represents the element of retreat, where resilient infrastructure actually allows a certain degree of erosion

to occur. In this instance, the water is allowed to rise and slowly increase and impede on the development. Investing in resiliency improvements is combined with allowing a 25% retreat of the water over the next 50 years to align with the state condition while achieving cost savings.

Along the Dorchester coastline in Boston, SCAPE is working to create and elevate a berm that enhances the wetlands habitat while keeping out water and preventing flooding. The project is focused on adapting to sea level rise, protecting against storm surge, minimizing wave action, and protecting against future erosion. The project also raised important questions about benefit-cost analysis (BCA), which does not typically capture the ecological value - as opposed to the economic value - of making these investments. Even without a strong BCA on paper, the project creates non-monetized benefits such as delaying the effects of climate change to give policymakers more time to respond.

In San Francisco, the China Basin Park project combines properties from three different owners to construct a 128-acre park in multiple phases. The first phase was completed in April 2024 and includes bay access, park space for up to 20,000 people, and new developments for office, residential, and lab uses. Phase 1, which successfully elevated the site by about 7 feet, included a step-down path to the waterfront, a 1-acre storm water garden, and sand banks to combat storm water surges while activating public spaces. The project won a national engineering award for its resilient features and creative development components and is already experiencing significant community interaction.


In all, this event provided a glimpse into some of the most pressing challenges in real estate today and offered real-time examples of how resilient methodologies are overcoming these issues. The active YLG participants from the audience continually engaged with the panelists about the concepts and the specific project details.
