How does Columbus transform for 2050?

GOLUMBŮS2050

Using the framework of ULI's national initiative, The City in 2050: Creating Blueprints for Change, Columbus 2050, provides a collaborative forum for land development leaders within the public and private sectors, to explore the underlying drivers of community growth, sustainability, and resilience.

The strategic vision is based on research conducted by undergraduate and graduate students from the City and Regional Planning program at The Ohio State University's Knowlton School, the results of a World Café event with local stakeholders, a series of public meetings, and comments gathered from the public, online, and at the City in 2050 ULI Exhibition at Easton Town Center.

This multi-year dialogue to raise awareness about the need for innovative development practices in central Ohio.

RESULTS:

- \$90,000 raised to fund the study
- 34 OSU student researchers
- +164 volunteers/participants
- City in 2050 ULI Exhibition at Easton Town Center (6-month exhibit)
- Vision Report: Columbus 2050 published in June 2012
- Key Findings Columbus 2050 called for a comprehensive regional development strategy and put a spotlight on the need to bring together the private and public community to help define development strategies for Central Ohio
- Formed collaborative partnership with ULI Columbus and the Mid-Ohio Regional Planning Commission to complete a regional growth scenario analysis, called insight2050

How does Central Ohio prepare for 3 million residents by 2050?



insight2050 is a public-private partnership to help Central Ohio better plan for growth over the next several decades. Engaging MORPC the region's planning authority and Columbus 2020 an economic development organization, in partnership with real estate community represented by ULI Columbus, has substantially reinforced awareness of the connection between economic development and land use that is critically important to Central Ohio's future success. The comparison of different density ratios has fostered discussions about the need for increased development densities and mixed-use development opportunities at a level and breadth not previously experienced within our region.

RESULTS:

- \$750,000 raised to fund the study
- insight2050 report published in November 2014
- +100 presentations to an audience of over 3,000 people
- +600 volunteer hours (ULI members, local stakeholders)
- Central Ohio unprecedented level of urban infill development projects
- insight2050 Academy for Public Officials with +75 regional participants







What is the impact of transit corridors on the future of the development in Central Ohio?

insight corridor 2050 CONCEPTS

Corridor Concepts was collaboratively led by MORPC and its public and private co-chairs, Columbus City Council President Shannon Hardin and ULI Columbus Chair Yaromir Steiner, along with several community partners. The study began in 2017 and concluded April 2019. Corridor Concepts explores how more walkable, compact neighborhoods and high-capacity transit along five representative routes can positively impact transportation, infrastructure, housing and the environment.

RESULTS:

- \$655,000 raised to fund the study
- insight2050 Corridor Concepts Report published April 2019
- Implementation Toolkit created for local communities
- Has led to the regional mobility initiative, LinkUS, by the City of Columbus and Central Ohio Transit Authority and the initiatives of the Northwest and East-West Corridors.





How can Central Ohio's natural waterways connect its residents?



Beginning in 2020, ULI and MORPC embarked on a project to develop a vision for an integrated open space network in central Ohio that will prescribe how to best use our natural assets to benefit the community. The RAPID 5 Project is a vision to re-frame the connectivity of the central Ohio region based on the natural geography defined by our waterways; to connect all Franklin County residents to the region's natural resources, cultural, and economic resources for recreation, commuting, commerce, education, and relaxation.

The five major waterway systems that would be interconnected include Big Walnut, Alum, Olentangy, Scioto and Big Darby. This framework will lay the foundation for developing one of the largest, if not the largest, inter-connected greenspace in the country.

- ULI Columbus and MORPC released the RAPID 5 Project Vision in July 2021

ULI Columbus, The Ohio State Center for Real Estate and Knowlton School of Architecture at The Ohio State University host the yearly ULI Hines Student Urban Design Competition Local Review. Members and the community experience the future of urban design and support local students who are challenging themselves to create thriving communities. Four teams of graduate students resent their final projects that were submitted for the national ULI Hines Student Urban Design Competition. In addition to networking opportunities with the graduate students before the main event, Columbus leaders interact and engage with the teams after the presentations about overall strategy and design.



RESULTS:

- +115 OSU students have participated
- 3 projects received honorable mention in the national competition
- +\$15,000 in scholarships awarded

ULI Columbus recognizes transformational development and positive community impact at the ULI Columbus Awards for Excellence held biennially. RESULTS:

- Sold out gathering that brings together professionals from the community
- 6 projects honored totaling \$666.8 million in public and private investment
